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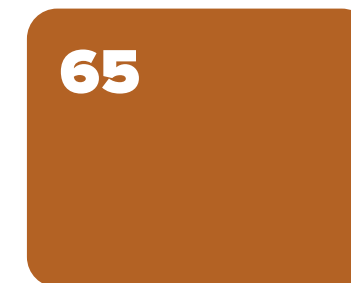

LETTER FROM THE CHAIRWOMAN OF THE BOARD

**You can't dream of a better future when you're hungry.
Neither for people nor for Brazil.**

Hunger is a major obstacle to the country's social and economic development. Studies show that without food security we won't make progress in productivity, education, or any other area.

We live in a country that is considered one of the world's breadbaskets, but hunger persists here. Today 33 million people have nothing to eat. At the same time, we waste around eight times the amount needed to feed this population. This is unacceptable and it was our dissatisfaction with this situation that motivated us to go one step further.

Pacto Contra a Fome was founded by 40 people after a long journey of active listening, studying, and building. Pacto is a supra-partisan, multi-sectoral movement whose purpose is to join forces and propose innovations to fight hunger and reduce food waste in Brazil.

In 2023 we structured our house and finally pressed start.



We have set up a robust governance system, formed by an assembly, a board of directors, and an extremely competent team of experts.

At the end of May, we held our official launch, which was attended by more than 900 people, including federal ministers, governors, organized civil society leaders, members of the private sector, and the press, demonstrating our broad capacity of mobilization against hunger.

The launch was accompanied by a set of important deliveries for society: the first edition of the Prêmio Pacto Contra a Fome, an award to recognize initiatives from the third sector; and the HUB, a platform to give visibility, boost, and connect those who work to reduce hunger and food waste. We ran a national campaign with artists and celebrities to propose reflections on future trajectories that might not happen because of hunger. We've reached 50 million Brazilians with this campaign.

On the following pages, you'll see that despite our short existence, we've achieved a lot. We've done this without reinventing the wheel; we've connected ourselves with people who work at the cutting edge and who have been engaged in the fight against hunger for years. The good news is that there are many initiatives, knowledge, and technologies available. We seek to be a bridge in this environment, promoting synergies and uniting everyone around this agenda.

We've worked together with experts and researchers to produce studies and technical notes that have guided discussions on food insecurity and food waste.

We liaise with key players from all sectors, reinforcing our belief that hunger can only be eradicated structurally and permanently through data, effective public policies, and, above all, joint effort.

The approval and enactment of the National Food Basket (Cesta Básica Nacional) in the Federal Constitution is one of the achievements we are most proud of. This was our first impact on a public policy that culminated in a historic achievement for the country.

We know that none of this would have been possible without the support of our partners and donors. Thank you! We also know that hunger doesn't wait, so there's no time to lose. We invite you to be part of this movement so that, together, we can guarantee everyone's most basic and essential right: food

MESSAGE FROM THE CEO



2023 was a challenging year. The start of Pacto Contra a Fome's activities marked not only the connection of people, organizations, and companies in the search for permanent and structural solutions to ban hunger and food waste in Brazil. Our efforts were also responsible for building a dedicated, dynamic, and committed team. And the results couldn't have been better.

We spent 223 days working hard and we have reached 2024 convinced that we are on the right track. What gives us this confidence are the results of 2023, but also the steps planned for 2024.

Looking to the future, we have taken on the task of implementing new projects and actions focused on strengthening important public policies, such as the National Food and Nutrition Security System (Sistema Nacional de Segurança Alimentar e Nutricional - Sisan) and the discussions around the composition of the National Food Basket (Cesta Básica Nacional).

Our first movements reinforced our conviction that the most efficient strategy for overcoming hunger is to collect reliable data, measure results, and coordinate actions with different actors. Keeping this in mind, we will start three projects in the North and Northeast regions of Brazil that will essentially unite governments, civil society, and companies on the same agenda. We will also work on projects that aim for socio-economic inclusion and access to food, always evaluating structural and permanent impacts.

This year is our first anniversary and will focus on putting hunger and reducing food waste on society's agenda by engaging, coordinating, and mobilizing everyone.

We have started 2024 with excellent results thanks to our partners - governments, companies, organizations, universities, and the press. Now is the time to look forward and make sure that all the lessons learned during the first year of operation will contribute to the movement in favor of ending hunger and reducing food waste in Brazil.

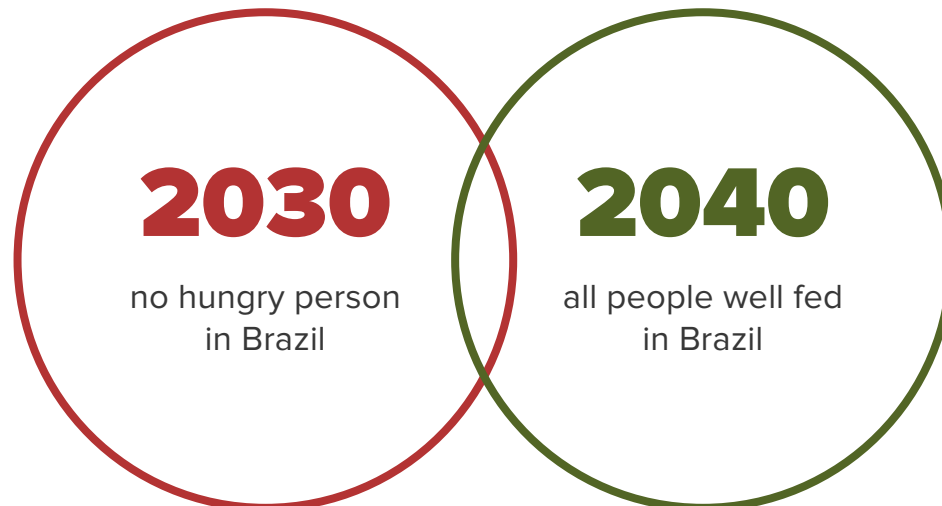

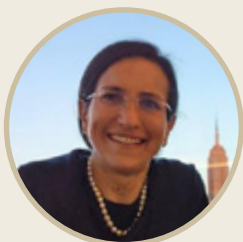

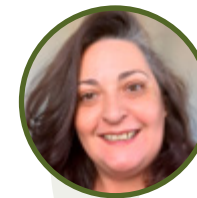

PACTO CONTRA A FOME – THE LAUNCH

Pacto Contra a Fome was officially launched on May 23rd after an important period of active listening, research, and co-construction. Not only we've presented our mission and strategy but used the event to propose a reflection on Brazil's reality.

Today, Brazil produces 161 million tons of food per year. Of this total, approximately 55 million tons are wasted throughout the food chain. This amount is eight times what is needed to feed the 33 million Brazilians exposed to severe food insecurity, the other words we use to define hunger.

The incoherence between hunger and food waste in Brazil was the thread we followed in our launch event, which brought together more than 900 people from different parts of society, such as ministers, governors, government secretaries, mayors, researchers, journalists, civil society, and business leaders.

We debated together to understand how each of these actors can contribute to reversing the actual scenario, and the possible ways to promote food security and reduce the environmental impacts caused by food waste.

The event also saw the unveiling of our first projects, which will be detailed in the following pages of this report: the Prêmio Pacto Contra a Fome 2023 and the HUB Pacto Contra a Fome. The two of them are relevant solutions for society that aim to recognize, connect, and boost initiatives that are active in the fight against hunger and food waste. In addition, we have launched a national campaign with personalities and influencers to mobilize Brazilians around these issues.





The fact that we've started our work alongside people who are so relevant to our purpose motivates us to keep moving steadily towards it: eradicating hunger and reducing food waste in Brazil by 2030, in line with the UN's Sustainable Goals targets. The broad and significant mobilization established at that moment reinforced our belief that we will get there if we work together.

PROJECTS

Pacto Contra Fome faces each project as part of the construction of something bigger: a Brazil with no hungry people by 2030 and a well-fed population by 2040. This is what drives us.

The way to achieve this mission is through the three pillars that guide our actions daily: engagement and coordination, intelligence, and incentives. We worked in 2023 to strengthen public policies and build collaborative pilot projects with governments, as well as to enable connections between impact initiatives by encouraging their work.



National Food Basket (Cesta Básica Nacional)

Goal: Contribute to the review and implementation of the National Food Basket as a guideline that promotes healthy eating considering the regional and cultural diversity of food.

Brazil is recognized as an international benchmark in public policies related to food security, such as the ones for school meals. However, the current scenario demands attention and actions to potentialize what has already been done and propose innovations that fit the new context we are living in. In the last ten years, we have gone through a series of interruptions and lack of investments in programs and policies and that's why it's necessary to look closely at this front in the upcoming years.

Pacto Contra a Fome uses data and evidence to set positive agendas in public food security policies, promoting favorable advocacy for fighting against hunger and food waste. An example of this is the work we are doing on the National Food Basket. In December 2023, the Proposed Amendment to the Constitution (PEC 45/2019), known as the tax reform, was approved.

The institution of a National Food Basket that promotes healthy eating and considers the regional and cultural diversity of food in the country was one of the main points of the debate - written in article 8 of the text.

This is a historic achievement for Brazil, given that the National Food Basket was last updated in 1938, 85 years ago. The National Food Basket is a key public policy to ensure that Brazilians have access to adequate food - fulfilling the human right established in the Federal Constitution.

Its enactment will guide decisions about which items should be in the basket, as well as establish guidelines for other issues such as taxation, anchoring the minimum wage, and school feeding policies.

WHAT DO THE COUNTRY AND THE BRAZILIAN POPULATION GAIN WITH THE NEW NATIONAL FOOD BASKET?

-  Greater access to adequate and healthy food, especially for people in situations of social vulnerability and food insecurity;
-  Incentives to maximize local markets by up to R\$86 billion in revenue;
-  Respect for and encouragement of the food and cultural diversity of each region of the country.

All regions and states are represented, especially the Northeast, which concentrates **27% of the initiatives**. Almost half of the initiatives (47%) are outside the Southeast. This demonstrates the diversity and the scope of the network.

Hunger happens in states, in cities, in neighborhoods, and communities.

That's why it's essential to think of ways to implement different actions, policies, and initiatives, considering the potential and challenges of each territory. Pacto Contra a Fome works hand in hand to support governments, civil society, and the private sector to advance this agenda in Brazil's most vulnerable places.

To make Ceará the first hunger-free state in the country.

This is the aim of this project, which began in July 2023. The territory was chosen after three phases. We listed the states with the highest prevalence of people experiencing severe food insecurity based on the mapping carried out by Rede Penssan in the II National Survey on Food Insecurity in the Context of the COVID-19 Pandemic in Brazil, both considering absolute and relative numbers. Ceará ranks fourth in this criterion, with 26.3% of its population exposed to hunger.

For the next step, our intelligence team analyzed the level of vulnerability of these states, considering other indicators, such as poverty. Based on the cross-reference between food insecurity and socioeconomic status, we prioritized ten territories, one of which was Ceará.

The Ceará Project was born to boost existing regional initiatives and join forces through multi-sectoral coordination, monitoring, evaluation, and the promotion of better eating practices. We act through actions with a structural and definitive impact to bring about real changes in the daily lives of those who need to eat decently.

To achieve this, we have developed a plan in line with the actions of the local government and with other players who are implementing measures in the state.

With each step taken, we reiterate our position that hunger can only be eradicated structurally and permanently through unity and with a coordinated effort between the government, the private sector, universities, third-sector organizations, and society.

PROJECT'S PHASES



Territory Diagnosis

We mapped more than 120 initiatives operating in the territory and interviewed 63 of them. We actively listened to the government about its main obstacles and support needs. Finally, we brought together 44 local leaders from different sectors to delve deeper into the opportunities and challenges faced in the different regions of Ceará.



Project design

Based on this assessment, we drew up a joint action strategy to be implemented in the territory. We also established the project's goals and which impact indicators will be monitored.



Implementation

Once we defined the way to go, we will implement the selected initiatives through the connection of local leaders. All the results obtained will be monitored, measured, evaluated, and disseminated through periodic reports.

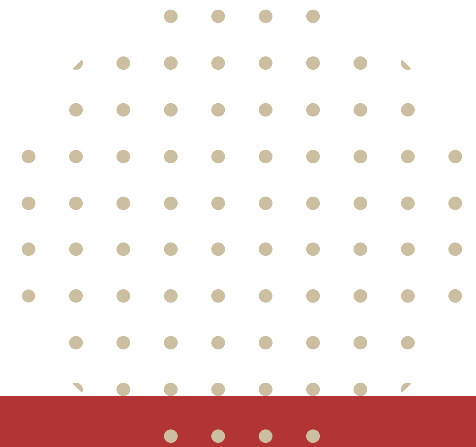

Reducing or reversing food waste | Structuring action

The program integrates a set of structuring initiatives that fight hunger. Some of the actions developed by Somos + VIP are the distribution of fresh food, the collection of vegetables that would otherwise be discarded, and social development as an alternative to the unhealthy work of garbage collection, generating income for those involved in the community.

STRATEGIC INTELLIGENCE

We base our work on data and science.

Hunger is a problem with many causes and origins and our mission is to eradicate it permanently and structurally. We are dedicated to understanding the various faces of hunger and the possible ways to fight it.

We've built the pillar for our systemic vision of hunger using in-depth studies of the data, evidence, and knowledge that already exists in public services, authorities, and the third sector. Here are some of our conclusions:

- 1** There is no single solution to end hunger structurally and permanently. We need systemic, multi-sectoral, and integrated actions.
- 2** Hunger must be an agenda for the whole society - governments, companies, organized civil society, and citizens - and we must act in a coordinated way.

Pacto Contra a Fome intelligence was crucial in producing materials with relevant indicators and data to understand the phenomena of hunger and food waste, pointing out possible ways to move forward on this agenda as a country more quickly and assertively.

To this end, we produced a series of bibliographical reviews and technical notes in partnership with renowned researchers. These actions were aimed at understanding the root causes, consequences, and nature of the fight against hunger, as well as evaluating the impact of federal public policies aimed at food security and waste. We would like to thank Adriana Veiga Aranha, Danielle Cireno Fernandes, Jorge Neves, Ana Luiza Gomes Domingos, Audêncio Victor, and Thays Nascimento Souza for helping us.

All the evidence we obtained served as a basis for our projects, for our activities, and was essential for starting to develop a theory of change that will guide our strategy.

IN 2023, WE'VE MADE...

Diagnostic Map of Hunger and Food Waste in Brazil

We've produced an initial diagnosis of hunger and food waste in Brazil, gathering and cross-referencing data from different databases and surveys, willing to provide a starting point for anyone who wishes to act on this subject. The material was developed in partnership with Consultoria do Amanhã, Integration Consulting, and the União SP initiative.

Mapping the level of vulnerability of each state

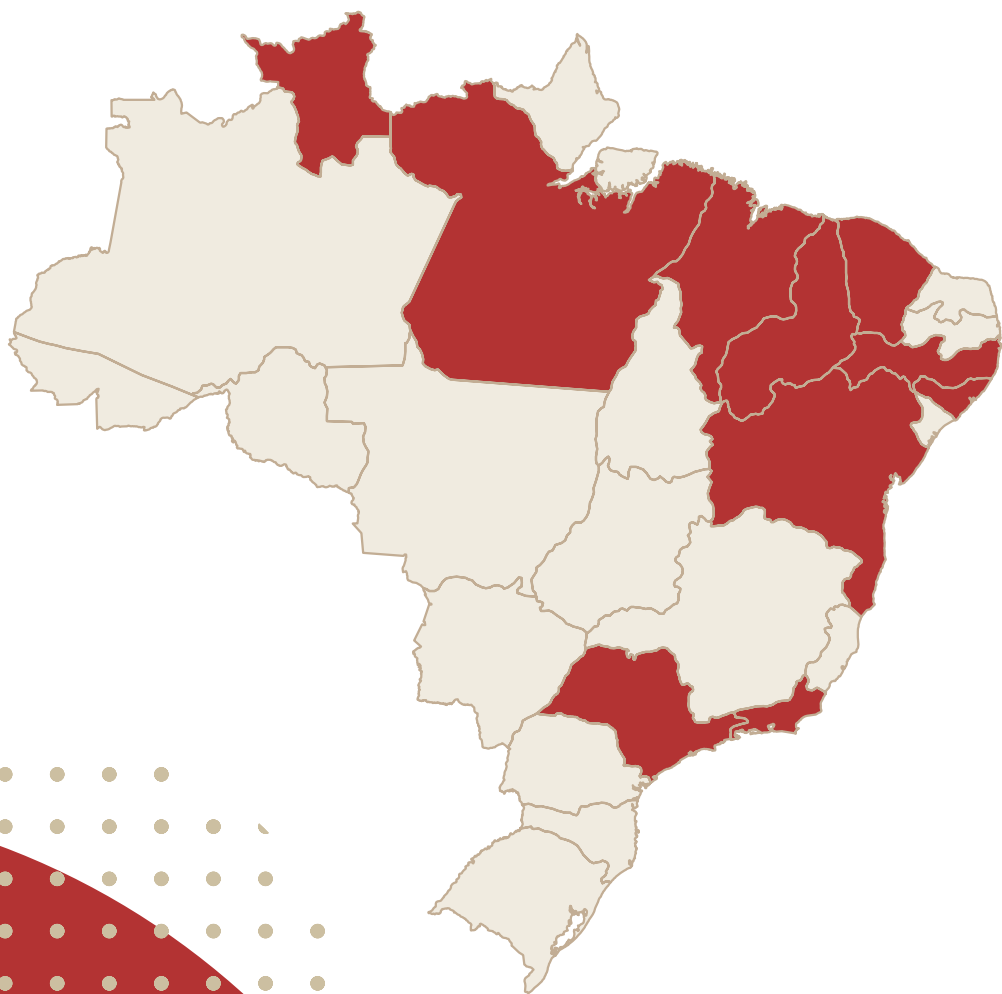
We mapped the vulnerability of Brazilian states based on the food insecurity indicators produced by the Penssan Network and socio-economic indicators such as extreme poverty and inequality from the Brazilian Institute of Geography and Statistics (IBGE).

We aimed to understand which territories have the most urgent situation in terms of food insecurity and in terms of what causes the problem: extreme poverty and inequality.

We've listed the ten most vulnerable territories based on this cross-checking.

The aim is to create a network for exchanges and to strengthen public policies and Sistema Nacional de Segurança Alimentar e Nutricional – Sisan (the national food and nutrition security system).

10 states with the highest levels of social vulnerability and hunger:



*This index comprises the integration of three indicators: **severe food insecurity** (both in volume and spread), **poverty, and inequality**. Pacto Contra a Fome developed a ranking of the states facing the most emergencies in these three aspects. We also considered priorities based on each state’s position in this ranking. We identified the 10 states with the worst situations.*

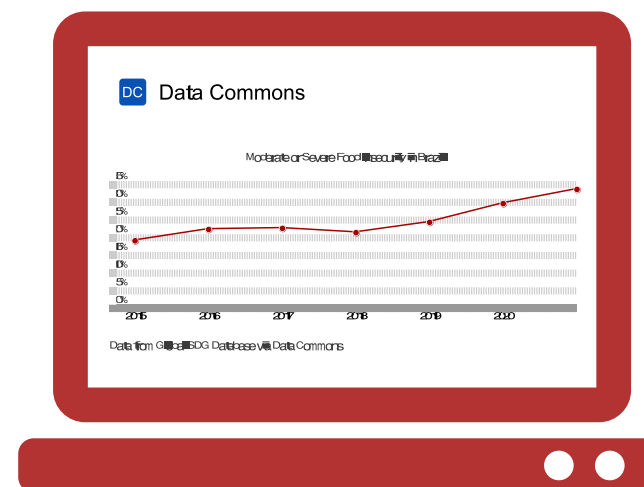
WHAT COMES NEXT

During the research and study process, we noticed that there is a lot of data and evidence on the phenomenon of hunger, as well as solutions and technologies to tackle it. However, this information is decentralized and is not integrated.

We've started to design a tool that will enable a holistic view of the indicators already built up by government and society, to shed light on the different natures of hunger and the results of public policies that act on its root causes.

The first step has already been taken: we have integrated part of the existing public databases into Data Commons* in partnership with Google, and today it is already possible to access it virtually, with a simple search.

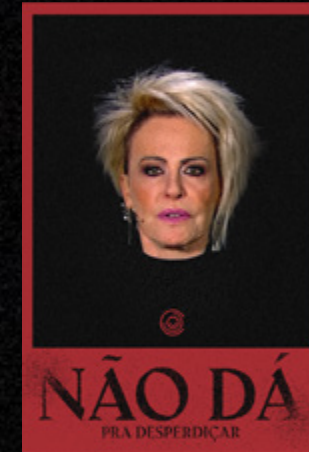

This was the motto of our first national campaign carried out by Africa Creative, a major institutional partner of Pacto Contra a Fome.

We brought together important personalities such as **Criolo, Ivete Sangalo, Ana Maria Braga, Naiara Azevedo, Formiga, Pequena Lo, Marcelo Adnet, and Ivan Baron*** to generate awareness of the consequences of hunger for Brazilians' future.

This campaign was our kick-off, helped us to launch the movement throughout Brazil, and revealed the serious reality that the country faces today: there are 33 million people exposed to hunger, while we waste eight times what is necessary to feed this population.

The song and music video were exclusively broadcast on May 21st on the TV show Fantástico from TV Globo and continue to engage people, organizations, and companies on social networks.

In this first year, we have sought to build a diverse network, reinforcing our supra-partisan and multi-sectoral action.



Governments

Pacto Contra a Fome's view of the public authorities is that they have significant tools and equipment to change the situation of hunger in our country structurally and permanently. This year, we sought to contribute through data and coordination with different key players. We've presented our studies on waste and hunger and took part in the ecosystem's main conferences.

We also held more than 50 technical working meetings - at national and federal states level - in 13 of Brazil's territories, to understand the challenges faced in each of them and to provide support.

Private Sector

The participation of the private sector is urgent and necessary to face the global scenario of hunger, climate crisis, poverty, and social inequality. The ESG practices point the way, including a set of actions aimed at environmental sustainability, social responsibility, and corporate transparency.

Research shows that companies are already moving towards the United Nations (UN) 2030 Agenda. According to the 2022 Benchmarking of Corporate Social Investment (BISC) report, carried out with 324 companies, half of them have already incorporated the perspectives of the Sustainable Development Goals and 40% said that the internal agenda is being directed towards this.

In 2023, we focused part of our work on bringing together and mobilizing companies around the issues of food insecurity, food waste, and reducing environmental impacts - including the food sector and technology giants.

Whether through incentives, such as Prêmio Pacto Contra a Fome, or through partnerships and joint projects, such as the HUB, we reaffirm our conviction that the private sector has a lot to contribute to eradicating hunger and to transform the sustainability of food systems.

This year we had 15 financial donors and 15 partners who are essential to our work and demonstrate our multi-sectoral and diverse vision.

We've made more than 80 field visits and several working meetings throughout 2023 to third-sector initiatives working at the frontline, churches, and universities.

All these meetings brought us different perspectives and knowledge about fighting hunger and reducing food waste. They also showed us that Brazil has a lot to learn from itself: there are already hundreds of actions and technologies aimed at fighting hunger and reducing food waste. What is needed is to generate scale, uniting them with synergy.

Pacto Contra a Fome seeks to contribute more and more to promoting these connections and enhancing solutions.
